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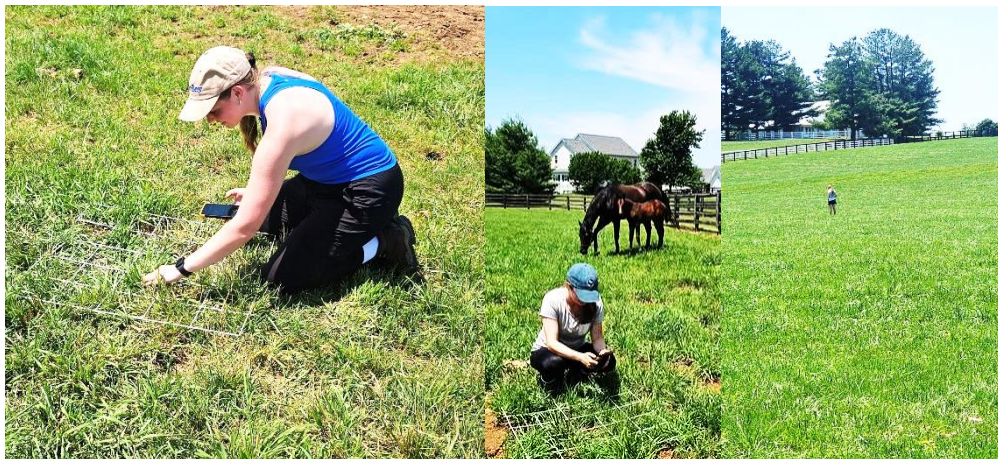
UK Horse Pasture Evaluation Team Continues to Provide Invaluable Data

Pastures are the lifeblood of any horse farm, and people who visit Endeavor Farm can see that we put a lot of work into making sure that our residents have plenty of good grass to eat. We manage our pastures under the guidance of the University of Kentucky Horse Pasture Evaluation Program, who have been providing us with vital pasture information since 2018. Each May, the team comes out to the farm to sample every field and paddock for species composition. They also do tall fescue analysis in fields where we have pregnant mares to make sure that the horses are not being exposed to toxic levels of ergovaline, which can cause complications in late gestation. They compile all of this data into a digestible format so that we can utilize their recommendations to determine when to optimally drill new seed, apply fertilizer, control weeds, and renovate fields or paddocks if necessary. The pasture evaluation team has been instrumental in helping us to best manage our pastures, and the proof is in the pudding. Our grass continues to improve year after year, and we have a lot of happy residents here on the farm. Thank you all for all that you do for our horses!
